Autumn/Winter 2010 Birdwing News - 1

Autumn migration

This autumn saw a number of rare birds spotted in Northern Greece, including Terek Sandpiper (*Xenus cinereus*), Grey and Red-necked Phalaropes (*Phalaropus fulicarius and P. lobatus*) at the Axios/ Aliakmon/Loudias region. At the Evros Delta the ringing programme discovered Barred and River Warblers (*Sylvia borin and Locustella fluviatilis*) and a Bluethroat (*Luscinia svecica*), large numbers of Glossy Ibis (616), White Pelicans (550) and Ruddy Shelduck (30) were also counted at the Delta.

At Lake Kerkini in October a very unusual Griffon Vulture (*Gyps fulvus*) spent four days here before sadly colliding with power lines. Also counted on the 25th were 3220 Flamingos, 134 Spoonbills, 68 White-fronted Geese, 33 Lesser White-fronts, 14 Greylags, 1000 Dalmatian Pelicans, 1520 Avocets, 12 Spotted and 2 Lesser Spotted Eagles. November brought 187 White-fronted Geese, (*Anser albifrons*) 53 Lesser White-fronts (*A. erythropus*), 15 Greylags (*A.anser*) and a variety of raptors, including 2 White-tailed (*Haliaeetus albicilla*), 8 Spotted (*Aquilla clanga*) and a late Lesser Spotted Eagle (*A.pomarina*) and 2 Peregrines (*Falco peregrinus*).

Tern raft thanks

We, as representatives of Birdwing, received this message of thanks from the National Park of Kerkini Lake and felt we must pass it on to all of you who have made donations and bought our books. Given the success of the raft this year with the breeding of at least 14 pairs of Common terns (Sterna hirundo) we hope to pay for further rafts in the future.

Axios News

The Axios - Loudias - Aliakmon Management Agency have introduced free guided tours around the National Park. These monthly trips began in October and are encouraging people from the region to get to know the Park better. The tour involves a guided trip by minibus to Kalochori lagoon, the Environmental Park alongside the Gallokos River and the coastal embankment from Kalochori back towards Halastra.

The response has been excellent, with a large number of bookings from the residents of Thessaloniki and there have been requests for participation from Eginio, Veria, Katerini and elsewhere. The response has been so positive that, within a few days, all the places available for the coming months have been filled. There are plans to continue the initiative through next year and so the Agency invites anyone interested to send their application via the website of the Management Body (www.axiosdelta.gr), to book a place.

"The interest is pleasing and it also shows a new tendency of people living in urban areas to recognize the value of natural ecosystems that are found close to them. They want to learn more about these things and enjoy the beauty they offer. It was for us a very pleasant surprise," said Communications Manager of the Management Agency, Lia Papadranga.



Bird Festival 2010

The sunny weather helped this year to make the Bird Festival in Nea Agathoupolis a great success. Dozens of young children enjoyed the games and activities, watched the wetland birds, and participated in raffles in aid of the Hellenic Ornithological Society (HOS).

The Bird Festival is held every first Sunday October at the purpose-built observation tower at New Agathoupolis and is organised bv the Management Body of Axios - Loudias - Aliakmon and the HOS, with support from the Municipality of Methoni. It is an annual event that takes place in 24 European countries coordinated by Birdlife International.



Currently the manuscript is at the printers and copies are due to be sent to us before the end of December. We will let you know **as soon** as they arrive, so please be patient until we let you know!


Thanks to all of you for voting and we hope you like the new edition.



The new edition of the book is a much enlarged book covering both North-eastern and North-western areas.

Here's a quick summary of the highlights of the new edition that has 75% more pages:

- Detailed information on the Amvrakikos, Kalamas and other sites on the Western Coast
- A large detailed section on the wonderful Prespa Lakes
- Better quality printing and binding (the last time we printed the books from our own office!)
- Detailed maps and descriptions of the areas around Thessaloniki, including the Axios-Aliakmon-Loudias region, Alikes Kitrous, Nea Agathoupoli and (on the eastern shore) Angelohori and the Epanomi lagoons
- GPS (Global Positioning System) data to be used by those with SAT NAVs or GPS equipment, such as those on mobile phones
- Information on Mount Paggeo (Pangaion) near Kavala and Lakes Koronia and Volvi
- 10 more sites in the Kerkini area and new sites in the Evros Hills
- Extended sections for Porto Lagos and the Nestos region
- Additional sites, including Mount Olympus, Lake Karla, the Rodopi and the Pindos Mountains.
- More detailed maps and directions throughout



Remember – all proceeds go towards helping birds in Northern Greece – so, if even if you've got a copy of the last book, don't miss out – buy this one too. The birds will appreciate it and you'll have many more places to explore on your visits to the special areas of Northern Greece.

When we set up Birdwing, a little over 2 years ago, we did so with the following aims:

1) Raising awareness



- to bring more eco-tourists to the important birds areas of Northern Greece so that they become more valued and therefore protected
- to provide education for children and local people about birds

2) Raising money



 for direct habitat improvement to help birds whose habitats are at risk

3) Speaking out



- to publicise issues impacting on birds in Greece (strengthened by developing a large membership base)
- by writing to and emailing decision-makers

So, with these aims still at the centre of our decision-making we are keen to move forward with Birdwing and to develop a longer-term plan.

One option is to become a **registered charity**. The advantages of this are that we could approach larger businesses and a wider range of individuals for contributions and it would provide the organisation with a special tax status.

To become a UK charity an organization should show that they have an income of £5000 and have a board of trustees with a strong personal commitment to the charity's aims.

For Birdwing to move in this direction we think it would be necessary to have some degree of regular donations from members, such as a small annual donation of €10 or so. This, combined with income from book sales and other fund raising events, would ensure that we had a stable financial base.

- f) conducting a questionnaire about action that should be taken to help Greek birds
- g) writing, designing & selling the 'Ο παιδικός οδηγός για τα πουλιά της Ελλάδας' book (The Children's Guide to Birds of Greece)



- h) continual lobbying through letters and emails to MEPs, Greek governmental and nongovernmental organizations and individuals
- i) writing over 50 bird articles for the Greek Athens News English language newspaper



- j) being interviewed and appearing on ET3 TV news about illegal hunting
- k) attending British Birdwatching Fairs
- I) running a photography competition
- m) providing continual support and information to birdwatchers planning a visit to Greece
- n) paying for the construction of a Tern raft at Lake Kerkini
- o) appearing in a feature article in New York's 'National Herald' newspaper



- p) raising money for future projects through donations and book sales
- q) developing a facebook presence
- r) writing and publishing the second edition of Birdwatching in Northern Greece

Environmental Education at Evros

The Evros Delta Visitor Centre has been in constant operation since 1997. Right from the first day it was considered vital to implement educational projects to raise public awareness for the protection of the environment and more specifically of the wetland of the Evros Delta.

At the beginning, the educational activities were very simple, providing information for students and teachers about the area and its important features, followed by a tour of the wetland.

Gradually staff at the Centre came to realise that to raise public awareness, especially in the local school children, the implementation of more complex activities and longer term projects were needed.

Here are some of the educational activities implemented as part of National and European Programs, or through the activities of the Evros Delta Management Body.

- Creation of the "Suitcase for the Evros Delta". It was produced during the LIFE Project "Restoration and Conservation Management of Drana Lagoon" and contains educational activities for school children to be carried out in the Visitor Centre or in schools as it can be borrowed and sent all over the country.
- Eurosite award. In 2003 the Visitor Centre was awarded a prize for their educational projects during the celebration of "Green Days". The prize was given for the final presentation of the yearly project that was implemented during 2002 2003 with four schools of the area with the title "Drana: The History of a Lagoon".
- EPEAEK Project. For the school year 2007

 2008 the Management Body was financed by the Ministry of Education to implement "Environmental Education Programs in the Protected Area of Evros Delta". During this project children participated in daily or yearly projects of Environmental Education, while there was the opportunity to produce and print material such as a bird identification guide for children, a leaflet about the educational projects in Evros Delta and posters that were distributed in schools all over the country.



- Meetings for educators. With the co –
 operation of the Ministry's Local
 Departments of Primary and Secondary
 Education and environmental
 organisations, meetings were organised for
 the educators of the area and for the staff
 of the local Visitor Centres.
- Celebration Days. Each year the Visitor Centre celebrates with activities, in cooperation with Greek and International organisations: the World Wetlands Day, the Swallows Day (building of nests), the Green Days, the International Day for the Environment and the Birdwatching Fair.
- Yearly Educational Projects. These projects are designed for the schools of the area that are interested in Evros Delta and are implemented throughout the school year. They are adapted to suit the needs of each class. Many visits are made in the wetland and the children are able to learn about Evros Delta, through games, presentations, interviews with locals and also through team work.

Through this winter our work will continue with an Environmental Education Program for the children of 2nd Primary School of Alexandroupolis, as well as a daily program for visitors, while later one more meeting for the educators and the printing of educational material are scheduled.

We are the only Greek presence at the international exhibition held every year at Rutland Water in England. The presence of the Management Authority of Lake Kerkini in this global event is very important. Our staff provided information to visitors about Lake Kerkini as well as activities available in the area. For meeting birdwatchers this place is ideal. Our great joy was that so many English people have visited the region and many consider the region as one of the best in Europe for birdwatching. Our staff returned from England with very good impressions and experiences that will help us do our job better.
